Dear Friends

Our Holy Father Pope Leo comes from "Religious Life" – in his case from the Order of St Augustine, communities who follow the Rule of St Augustine. Most of us are not called to the cloister, we have dishes to wash, meetings to attend, children to raise etc. And yet, many people find themselves longing for something monasteries seem to hold: rhythm, meaning, peace. The good news is you don't need to be a monk to draw wisdom from religious life. A *rule of life* can anchor anyone who seeks to live with intention

Historically, the word "rule" (*regula*) didn't mean a set of laws to obey, but rather a guide for growing toward the good. Rules, like St Augustine's, weren't designed to stifle life but to shape it. A Rule balances prayer, work, community, and rest into a daily pattern that could be lived out faithfully even in times of uncertainty or suffering. while those in monastic communities take formal vows, each of us is called to discern how we uniquely live out our own vocation - whether that's through marriage, single life, consecrated life, or something still unfolding. Developing a somewhat personal rule of life can help us discover not just how to *live*, but how to live *well*, in a way that aligns with our deepest identity and gifts. In other words: You don't need to live in a monastery to live with clarity and holiness. But you *do* need some rhythm - a way of life that keeps you grounded when distractions multiply or fatigue sets in. A rule of life helps you say *yes* to what matters and *no* to what doesn't, not just in emergencies, but every day.

St. Benedict's motto, *ora et labora* - pray and work - speaks to this. His Rule didn't separate the sacred from the ordinary. Tending the garden, cooking the meals, caring for guests: it was all part of the same life of prayer. For us, too, our work, rest, and relationships can all be shaped by grace, if we approach them intentionally. Some people imagine a rule of life must be elaborate or intensely spiritual. In truth, it can be rather simple, or begin with adopting some *regular* habits - Sunday Mass is the obvious and fundamental example. Over time, these rhythms become formational. They reveal our unique spiritual temperament and charisms—what gives us life and how we are called to give life to others. The Catechism reminds us that "prayer and Christian life are inseparable" (CCC 2745). A rule of life honours that connection. It's not about doing more, but about **doing what matters**. We all live by some rule, even if we haven't named it. The question is: Is it forming us into the person we're meant to become? This could be a good Jubilee task for all of us.

PATTERN OF WORSHIP <u>NOW IN PLACE</u>: The schedule is as follows: <u>Sunday Mass:</u>

(6.00pm Saturday Anticipated Mass for those forced to work on Sunday)

This time changes to allow Confessions before Mass instead of afterwards.

8.30am ; 10.00am (with Children's Liturgy); 12 Noon; 6.00pm

Weekday Mass:

will continue as presently at **9.30am**, except that there will **be no Mass in the parish on Wednesdays**, except Holy Days, to allow me a day off. Saturday Mass remains at **10.00am**, followed by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

This pattern of worship is an experiment to see if it can be sustained.

The other important practical change to our usual arrangements will be the times that the church building is open for private prayer. As far as possible the church will open as usual at **8am on Monday**, **Tuesday**, **Thursday and Friday**, **and close on those days at 6pm**. On Saturday we will open at 9am and Sunday at 7.30am, closing after the last Mass on those days.

On Wednesdays at present, I regret, the church will be closed. On all weekdays, when nobody is present on site the building will be closed. At all such times a notice will be posted in the side door window with relevant information.

Sacrament of Reconciliation: The regular times will be on Saturday between 10.30 - 11.20am and 5.00 - 5.40pm.

Look for up-to-date notices about all this in the window of No.62 and on the notice board in church.
